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FORM I: HOLY COMMUNION

COLLECT

Eternal God, our maker and redeemer,
grant us, with your servant PHILIP, Duke of Edinburgh,
and all the faithful departed,
the sure benefits of your Son's saving passion
and glorious resurrection:
that, in the last day,
when you gather up all things in Christ,
we may with them enjoy the fullness of your promises;
through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord,
who is alive and reigns with you,
in the unity of the Holy Spirit,
one God,
now and for ever.
Amen.

or:

Merciful Father and Lord of all life,
we praise you that we are made in your image
and reflect your truth and light.
We thank you for the life of His Royal Highness PHILIP, Duke of Edinburgh,
for the love he received from you and showed among us.
Above all, we rejoice at your gracious promise to all your servants,
living and departed,
that we shall rise again at the coming of Christ.
And we ask that in due time we may share
with your servant Philip
that clearer vision promised to us
in the same Christ our Lord;
who is alive and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit,
one God,
world without end.
Amen.

PROPER PREFACE

your faithful servant PHILIP, Duke of Edinburgh,
that death may be for him the gate to life
and to unending fellowship with you;
where with your saints you live and reign,
one in the perfect union of love,
now and for ever.
